Dear Seminars Community,

Happy spring! May the season bring us all a sense of joy, renewal, and rebirth.

Many of us are feeling hopeful about being able to see people, hug loved ones, and generally get back to a kind of normal. We are still uncertain about the fall and what will be possible for seminar meetings. We will see what NYC and Columbia University officially recommend. Some seminars may choose to continue virtual meetings through the fall semester, which is fine. We will continue to support you.

If seminars can meet in person, we will have to slowly ramp up. We will be sensitive to what Faculty House can offer regarding space and food. We are also looking into new technology that will allow seminars to hold some hybrid or HyFlex meetings. The awfulness of not being able to be with family members and friends as they were dying and the necessity of postponing community mourning adds to individual grief and isolation.

I very much look forward to seeing many of you in person individually and in groups. Please continue to be careful. We are entering the home stretch.

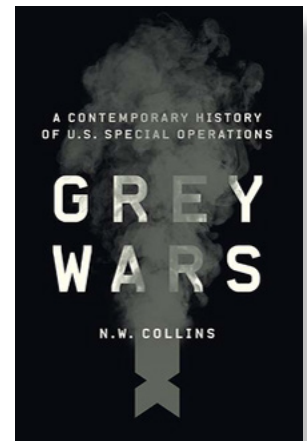
Mahnaz Moazami's *Laws of Ritual Purity* was published in January 2021 by **Brill Publishing**.

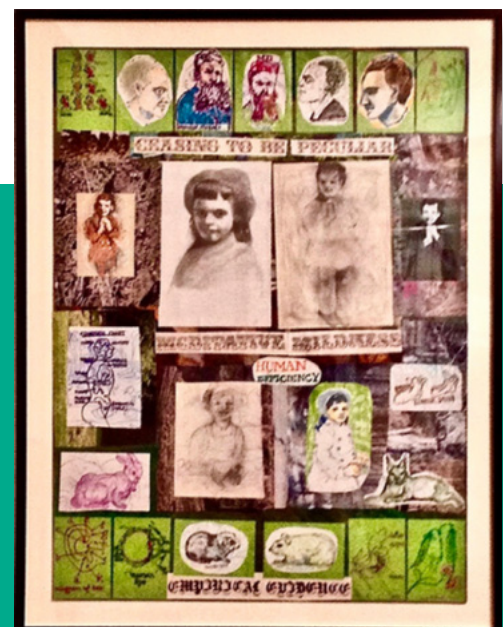
Applying an Equity Lens to Injury and Violence Prevention Symposium

Elizabeth K. Hill (1935-2021)

We are saddened to hear of the passing of our long-standing member and long-serving chair, Elizabeth K. Hill, who died in New York on March 28, 2021 after a brief illness.

Liz Krohne grew up in Wheaton, IL, and graduated from Lake Forest College. Moving to New York city to pursue graduate studies at Columbia, she wrote her MA dissertation on the English emblemist poet Francis Quarles, and her PhD on uses of the Song of Songs in seventeenth-century English poetry. She went on to teach English at Skidmore, Queen's College, and St John's University. Liz was a key member of the Seminar in the Renaissance for many years, serving as co-chair with Richard Harrier from 1996 to 2004, and then as chair from 2004 to 2014 (latterly as co-chair with John Wing and Alan Stewart). Her son Nicholas tells us that "participating in the Renaissance Seminar filled her with happiness and pride." In addition to her passion for Renaissance poetry, especially that of John Milton, Liz was known to friends for her skill as a painter (studying in later years at the Art Students League), jewelry-maker, and seamstress.

A full funeral service is planned for the fall of 2021.

Susan Field Senneff (1942-2021)

Susan Field Senneff, one of our longest-standing members, who was invited to attend the Renaissance Seminar as a graduate student in the 1970s, and who also served for six years at the turn of this century as Secretary of the Seminar passed away on March 6th in a hospice north of Manhattan.

Born on 21 May 1942, she was a graduate of Emma Willard School and Smith College. At Columbia—from which she held an M.A. with Honors and an M.Phil. degree—she was the student, in the Department of English and Comparative Literature, of Mar-

jorie Hope Nicolson, William Nelson, George Parks and Edward Tayler, and, beyond that department, of Eugene Rice and Matthew L. Jones (History), and of Paul Oskar Kristeller (Philosophy).

She took Kristeller's Techniques of Research in Medieval and Renaissance Philosophy in 1970-71, That course formed a special bond among those lucky enough to have had the privilege of taking it. Her incomplete dissertation was on Milton and his Circle in Italy, for which she travelled to Rome in the early seventies to do research in the Vatican Library (and perhaps the Vatican Archives as well). In October 2002, she offered a talk to our Seminar: "One of John Milton's Friends in Rome: Alessandro Cherubini."

Her other career was in writing and editing for medical and pharmaceutical publications and organizations, including Medical Tribune (on whose masthead she appeared), *Medical World News*, Roche, Warner-Lambert/Pfizer, and others.

Her inquisitive and retentive mind always had brilliant questions to offer our speakers. Her presence among us will be greatly missed.

Thomas J. Vinciguerra The Columbia College community mourns the passing of an outstanding journalist, editor and author, 57, who greatly enriched the life

of the university; he died February 22 in Garden City, NY, following a year of failing health. The longtime associate editor of the alumni magazine *Columbia College Today*, Tom later served as deputy editor of *The Week* and executive editor of *Indian Country Today*. He was a prolific freelancer who contributed many pieces to the *New York Times*, the *Wall Street Journal* and other publications. His

books include *Cast of Characters: Wolcott Gibbs, E.B. White, James Thurber and the Golden Age of the New Yorker*, and *A Community of Scholars: Seventy-Five Years of The University Seminars at Columbia*, which he edited. [Link to Obituary.](#)
