

End-of-Year Reminders for Chairs

Travel Fund Requests

Fall 2023 travel fund request deadline is June 30, 2023.

Travel fund requests are welcome on a rolling basis and ideally by June 30, for travel to take place in the fall of 2023. Please send all initial funding requests (forms are found on the Guidelines page of the website) by email to **Susan Boynton**. Chairs are encouraged to send travel budget requests for both fall and spring at the same time. Please send budget requests for spring 2024 travel by September 5, 2023. Once the overall budget has been approved, speakers may start planning travel by submitting a Travel and Accommodation Request Form.

End-of Year Reminders for Rapporteurs

Please submit minutes by May 15th. Hard deadline June 30th.

After that date, you can still be paid but it will take a little longer. Much later can be difficult.

As you may have noticed, you are no longer required to submit an archival announcement (Yay!) Less work for all of us.

If your seminar has a meeting after **May 15th**, please submit those minutes as soon as possible, but no later than **June 30, 2023**. This is a hard deadline. You will no longer have access to the submissions form after this date.

417 | Eighteenth Century



Abolitionism and the Arts

Opposition to slavery and the slave trade permeated the art worlds of literature, music, and visual art in the long eighteenth century. Europeans and Americans composed poetic critiques of the slave trade, sang songs of sympathy for enslaved people, and engraved images that asserted the common humanity of Africans and Europeans. This one-day interdisciplinary symposium, to be held at Columbia University on May 6, 2023, brings together musicologists, literary and theater scholars, art historians, and historians to think through the connections between the arts and the history of abolitionism in the Atlantic world.

Ronald Gross and **Elizabeth Cohn**, co-chairs of the Seminar on Innovation in Education and the Seminar on Ethics, Moral Education, and Society, co-hosted a webinar on January 17th on "Main Street: How a City's Heart Connects Us All" with author Dr. Mindy Fullilove. The session was conducted in collaboration with the Seminar on The City and the Seminar on Memory and Slavery: Social and Human Consequences. Dr. Fullilove's study was based on 11 years of investigating Main Streets in 178 cities, and her findings are currently being applied in numerous municipalities to re-design them for greater equity and healthfulness.

Exemplifying the potential advantages of collaboration among seminars with congruent interests, four groups met with Prof. Jack Snyder via Zoom on March 30th, for a discussion based on his latest book, Human Rights for Pragmatists. Prof. Snyder is the Robert and Renee Belfer Professor of International Relations at Columbia. His books include From Voting to Violence and Human Rights Futures. The collaborating Seminars were Innovation in Education; Ethics, Moral Education, and Society; Memory and Slavery; and Human Rights. The co-chairs of two of the collaborating Seminars, Dr. Elizabeth Cohn and Ronald Gross, reported that "Our discussion benefited enormously from contributions from each of the participating groups. The shared expertise and experiences were extraordinarily productive."

On March 6, Vânia Penha-Lopes, co-chair of the Brazil Seminar, was a speaker in the two-person panel titled "Mulheres Negras, Educação e Ciência" (Black Women, Education, and Science), an event sponsored by the National Council for Scientific and Technological Development (CNPq), an organ of the Brazilian federal government, in honor of Women's Month. On March 14-17, she attended the annual meeting of the International Studies Association in Montreal, Canada. She chaired a panel on the politics of vulnerability and exclusion (March 15), presented a paper on hegemonic masculinity in a panel on international political sociology and feminist theory and gender studies, and co-led an innovative session on the use of music and poetry in the classroom. She has also been selected to renew her tenure as Research Fellow of the Washington Brazil Office (2023-24).




Oscar White Muscarella, member of the University Seminar on The Ancient Near East, passed away on November 27, 2022, age 91, at his home in Pennsylvania.
